Summary

The purpose of this policy is to encourage a co-ordinated approach amongst staff, students and parents on the subject of bullying in order to reduce the incidence of bullying in the Academy. We take bullying very seriously and we will act vigorously to support students.

Bullying can take many forms, such as physical, verbal, psychological and increasingly cyber bullying. Bullying is the systematic, targeted, deliberate and on-going abuse of others.

Signs of bullying include:

- Student frightened to walk to the Academy
- Unusual attendance pattern
- Decline in behaviour or Academy work
- Withdrawn behaviour
- · Hitting out at others
- Sometimes tearful
- They 'lose' their money

These signs may of course have other causes and the list is not exhaustive.

The victim

Some students are one-off victims, some are perpetual victims. Research has shown that common traits of perpetual victims seem to be:

- Non-assertive
- · Lacking in humour
- Over-sensitive
- · Having difficulty in normal give and take of life
- Seen as a bit unusual from mainstream society (different from the norm)

The bully

Some of those who bully have been bullied themselves. Bullies also require help in terms of firm guidelines in their behaviour and re directing bullying behaviour towards more constructive activities.

Dealing with the incident

Prevention strategies may include:

- · Raise awareness in assemblies and form time
- Clear guidelines for behaviour
- Vigilant staff to pick up subtle clues to incidents
- Promoting discussion amongst groups and identified potential victims

Guidelines for staff, students and parents are included in this policy. Staff guidelines will be included in the staff handbook and student guidelines displayed in planners and classrooms.

Guidelines for all staff

If you see a student being bullied:

- Intervene and stop the incident
- Find out what the issue is
- If time does not allow refer to respective HOY as soon as possible
- Record incident on CPOMS

HOY and Pastoral Assistant roles:

- Interview students concerned
- Contact parents
- Record details on CPOMS
- Support the bullied student with appropriate strategies (bully book, coping strategies, time out card etc.)
- Take appropriate action with the bully

HOY must be informed of any incidents of bullying that are being dealt with by form teachers or classroom teachers. HOY will discuss ongoing issues at HOY weekly meetings.

SLT role:

• Support middle leaders and class/form teachers in responses to incidents particularly where they cross into different years.

Serious or repeat incidents will be discussed at meetings of SLT.

Guidelines for students

If you are being bullied:

- Tell someone (friend, parent, teacher)
- Expect to be listened to and taken seriously
- The teacher will talk to you about the incident somewhere quiet
- The teacher will discuss the possible action that will follow including contacting parents
- Teachers will support you and keep in touch to check on progress
- Eventually a meeting may be set up with you and the bully with a member of staff but only if you feel happy to do so

If you are bullying someone:

- People who bully often have their own problems, you may need help.
- If someone claims to have been bullied it is likely that it will be investigated.
- Some form of action will occur, including contacting your parents. You may be excluded from academy or isolated from the academy community.
- We will be talking to the person you are bullying to hear what harm and hurt you are causing
- Cyber bullying through Facebook, texting etc. can be one of the most hurtful forms
 of bullying, be aware and in control of your communication through these types of
 media.

If you see someone being bullied:

 You must tell someone, a teacher, friend or parent as soon as possible. Try to remember exactly what happened. If cyber bullying is occurring, hard copies of the communication may be helpful.

Awareness

We will ask for your opinion on bullying from time to time in surveys. Be honest and this will help us to help you.

We will be talking about bullying in assemblies and form time.

Guidelines for parents

If you suspect your child is being bullied:

- Talk to your child and find out the details
- Make contact with your child's form tutor or Head of House to report the incident
- If it is a form of cyber bullying (Facebook, Text etc.), then hard copies of the communication may be helpful
- Staff at the Academy will initiate an investigation and you can expect some form of communication to discuss the possible course of action.

If we suspect that your child is being bullied, we will:

- Talk to your child to gather evidence and details of the incident
- Talk to other students
- Act in line with the behaviour policy in terms of a proportionate response
- Make contact with you to keep you updated and discuss the situation

If your child is bullying another student:

 We will contact you to discuss the evidence after a discussion with the parents of the alleged bullied child.

If your child is being bullied, we will:

- Listen to your child and treat the incident seriously
- Carry out an investigation
- Report back to you what action is going to be taken
- Provide support for your child in terms of coping strategies, regular checks by a nominated member of staff, recording of details and discussions as required
- Contact the parents of the students concerned
